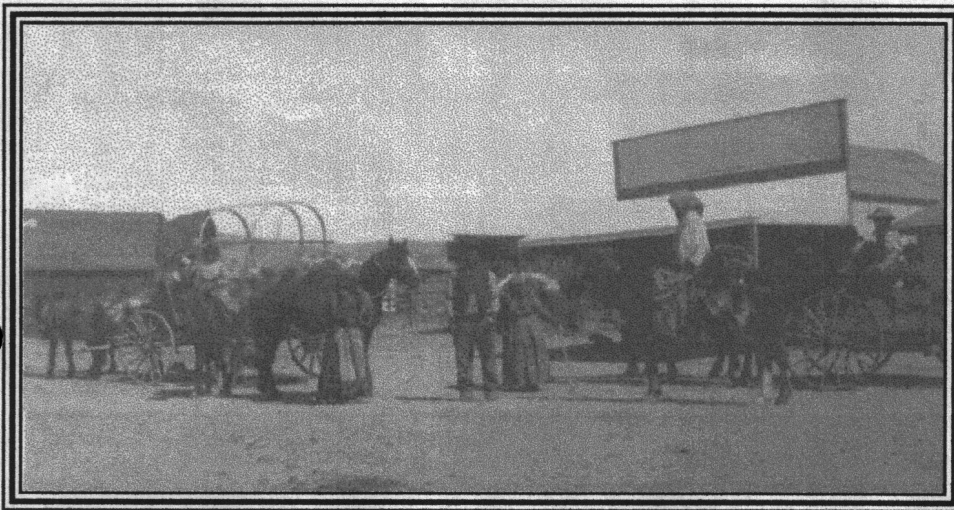

# “Where Christmas Was Born”

Micah 5:2

“But as for you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, too little to be among the clans of Judah, from you One will go forth for me to be ruler in Israel. His goings forth are from long ago, from the days of eternity.”

In May of 1996, I had a once in a lifetime opportunity to visit Israel and the city of Bethlehem, the town where Jesus was born according to the prophecy above. It was a trip specifically designed for pastors who were considering sponsoring tours to the Holy Land. In a matter of five short days, we took busses, ran, jogged and walked to every possible holy place in the region, which a normal person would usually take ten to fifteen days to accomplish. As some of you may know, I am not a normal person, so the trip fit me like a glove.

You’re probably thinking to yourself, “I know that the Lord Jesus was born in Bethlehem, what’s the point?” Ah, the point is, that there wouldn’t be any holy sights to visit in Israel if it wasn’t for an innkeeper’s daughter, named Helena, who just happened to be the mother of Emperor Constantine of Rome. You see, both Constantine and his mother were both Christians and it was important for Helena to locate as many holy sights in Israel as possible. I know, you have another question, “Why in the world did she have to locate all the holy sights, weren’t they preserved for posterity and history?” The answer to that question is NO! Conquerors over the centuries literally destroyed many of the significant locations where Jesus walked, taught and died. A few of the sights are the result of extensive study and more than likely an educated guess. Take the tomb of Jesus for example. However, Helena took the time and spent a substantial amount of money to find as many sights as

possible and preserve them. By the way, if you didn’t know, she did this in the 4<sup>th</sup> century AD! Nearly 300 years after the resurrection of Jesus!

Without a woman like Helena, much of the most important historical sights in Israel, including those related to Christmas may not have been found or preserved. However, because of her efforts, every Christmas in Bethlehem from then and until now is a special event for Christians all over the world. Granted, we would have a Christmas holiday whether or not we knew where the location of Jesus’ birth was, but it’s nice to know that someone took the time and effort to make it enjoyable for everyone.

The preservation of our history here in Nevada is important to all of you who subscribe to the BMHS Newsletter. It is your commitment that makes our task enjoyable in being able to provide you with the rich heritage, which benefits us as well as our future generations.

# Bullfrog Mining District History

## Bullfrog Golden Sceptre Mine



**T**he Golden Sceptre Mining Company was organized under Arizona Territorial Laws, probably in May of 1905. In June of 1905, it started to become a large holder of claims in the Rhyolite area of the Bullfrog Mining District. The earliest Quit Claim recording for the Golden Sceptre was recorded June 7, 1905. James B. Dugan, Frank Binane(?), A. Reginal and M. Foran, giving title to the White Monument Lode Claim to the Golden Sceptre. On June 19, 1905, J.C. McCormack Quit Claimed the Terry Claims to the Golden Sceptre as well as the Side Scofrel(?) Lode Claim and the Judges Lode Claim all located on Bonanza Mountain.

On July 26, 1905, J.C. McCormack Quit Claimed The Twirler. On August 15, 1905, Frank Bencese(?), P.W. Lamona, and P.J. Zwiefle of Rhyolite Townsite Company, sold to the Golden Sceptre, the Lode Claim known as the Gold Wedge (Ledge?). October 7, 1905, J.C. McCormack sold to the Golden Sceptre, Tunnel and Tunnel sites known as the Tramp Mountain Tunnel and site located and claimed on July 20, 1905. The Golden Sceptre came in with some of the early production claims and continued to influence the district for the next couple of years. (certificate courtesy of Bullfrog Billy)

ANY men who tried their luck in Tonopah and Goldfield with indifferent success, went to Bullfrog with the first rush, and in that new field made both name and fortune. Among the pioneers of Rhyolite who have had remarkable success are the Murphy brothers, four in number and fine fellows, all of them.

At present there is but one of them in Rhyolite, Dan Murphy; his brothers whose names are closely connected with the early history of the camp, have departed for other fields.

Dan Murphy was the first of the brothers to arrive. He came from Colorado where he had been mining for several years and pitched his tent first in Tonopah and later in Goldfield. He had learned his mining lessons from the field, and was thus able to take advantage of the many good opportunities. He secured some good claims and some of these helped very materially to increase his bank account.

He is one of the inmates of "The Bullpen," and the Bullpen is famed afar. Everyone who knows anything about the Bullfrog district knows a little about this jolly bachelor house around which much of the social life of the camps center. With Miles and Clement Millward, and J. L. Cadogan, Dan Murphy completes a quartet of royal hosts who have entertained many a visitor and sent him away praising the hospitality, and in fact everything else, in Rhyolite. Young, generous hearted, daring, possessed of keen Irish wit and Western broadness, Dan Murphy is a man who needs only to be known to be admired.

## Mining News

From

### Over the Range

#### Ballarat and Panamint Districts Going Ahead

Shorty Harris blew in from a long trip thro' the Death Valley, Panamint and Argus ranges a day or two ago and reports progress on work at various places visited. In Goler canon, 20 miles south of Ballarat, Fred Gray and Thurman have a deal on with Colorado people for an amount in six figures, which will probably go through. This property is regarded as one of the best in that country and there has been a lot of development work done and ore blocked out. In Pleasant canon several men are working on the Mountain Boy mine and probably 30 men are working on other properties. Mayor Harper and Los Angeles people are working a force of 25 men on the Gem property in Jail canon and have a 5-stamp mill in continuous operation and are milling a good quality of ore.

Jack Hartigan, well known in Rhyolite is running the Ballarat hotel. P. H. Winston, formerly of this place, has

a road contract near Hot Springs.

The Providence property in the Wild Rose district has several men employed in development work and the bottom of the shaft is in good ore and high grade values in the ore body are of frequent occurrence.

Mr. Harris states that the Skidoo mines and mill are employing a force of 75 to 80 men and the proposed custom mill at Skidoo is assured. In Surprise canon Mike Brennan and partners are operating a lease on the Russel properties and are packing high grade silver ore down 7 miles to the mouth of the canon, hauling it 65 miles by wagon to the railroad and still making a good profit.

In Riley canon in the Argus there are 25 men employed on the Iron Dyke property and development shows it is an immense low grade copper proposition, giving promise of a great production in the near future.

## Sen. Newlands

### Made a Good Political Speech

#### Opera House Crowded to Hear Him

Senator Frances G. Newlands addressed the voters of Rhyolite at the opera house last night on the issues involved in the present campaign and was listened to attentively by a crowded house, during an address of nearly two hours' duration. Glay Tallman, candidate for state senator, introduced the speaker.

Senator Newlands is an easy, forceful speaker. His very earnestness carries conviction and convinces his hearers that he knows and believes what he is talking about.

The main part of the address last evening was devoted to national issues and it was made plain that the Republican leaders were not behind Roosevelt in his reform measures and that no hope in that direction could be had by continuing them in power. Liberal applause greeted the speaker at the mention of the name of Wm. J. Bryan.

On state issues the speaker spoke briefly and promised that the Democratic party would remove the objectionable from the police bill, and make it as was intended, a "peace measure for the entire state."

P. L. Flanigan, candidate on the Republican ticket for U. S. senator, came in for severe castigation and his record on the 8-hour bill and other measures favorable to the miner, were brought prominently before the audience.

**STATE MINING NEWS**

The Jamieson-Bolen Leasing company is playing in great luck. Having a lease on a lot of ground in the heart of Austin and going to work upon it with vigor, a ledge has been opened up that will excite the envy of all bonanza miners in the state. This lease is on a property belonging to H. G. Richardson, an old-time Cripple Creek mining man, who believes Austin will again duplicate the record of the great Colorado camp. The work of the lessees consists of a 46-foot incline shaft and in this a ledge varying from four to seven feet in width has been opened up which carries values of high milling to the shipping grade. The lowest assay so far obtained gave 60 ounces in silver and \$6 40 in gold. The strongest mineralization appears as stephanite, horn silver and ruby silver.

The work on the Highland Chief group, located in Queen canon, adjoining the old Indian Queen mine, is progressing very satisfactorily. The tunnel is now in a distance of 150 feet and although no ore was expected for at least 100 feet a number of stringers of high grade silver-lead ore have been encountered. These stringers all run parallel to the main ledge as shown on the surface and are no doubt feeders to the main ore body. The company intends to work a force of men all winter and will soon erect suitable buildings on their property for the accommodation of their employes.

The Eagle Leasing company, which has taken a lease on the Gold Mountain Eagle company's property at Gold Mountain, adjoining the Empress mine, reports the crosscut tunnel being driven to cut the vein at depth is now in 160 feet and should cut the vein at 300 feet, where they expect to develop a good body of ore which showed on the surface.

Signs are becoming manifest of a renewal of mining interest in the Bovard district, located about 25 miles southwest of Rawhide. During the past few weeks the section has been filling up with prospectors, leasers and prospective purchasers of mine acreage, with the result that it is decidedly probable Bovard is to enjoy a prolonged season of prosperity: a prosperity which is unquestionably warranted by the mineral showing there.

One shaft is down 1,000 feet and the other 900 feet; sinking and drifting are continuous. Rich kidneys of ore are being encountered in the drifts but no extensive bodies are expected to be encountered until the main ledge is struck. The Furnace Creek company is down to the 800-foot level and orders have been received from Mr. Patrick Clark not to "stick a pick in the walls" until the 1,500-foot level is reached. The endeavor to prove these two properties is being prosecuted in a very thorough manner and the stockholders are getting a run for their money.
